n behalf of all of us at Hospitality House, we extend our deepest gratitude to our friends, colleagues and supporters for your generosity, your encouragement, and your belief in possibilities. Because of you, we celebrate another remarkable year of accomplishments, triumphs, milestones. Because of you, we've rediscovered something else...

The power of community.

This past year, San Franciscans continued to face the ongoing challenge of the COVID crisis, as well as the deadly drug overdose epidemic. In less than two years, more

than 2,100 San Franciscans—family members, friends, neighbors— died of COVID-19 related causes or drug overdoses. <u>A San Franciscan died</u> <u>of an overdose or COVID-19 every eight hours!</u> Public health workers, first responders, nonprofit workers – to name but a few - faced unprecedented challenges, overwhelming physical and emotional burdens, unrelenting trauma, every day, every hour, seemingly every moment. They summoned courage, commitment, determination, and...

Our unforgettable experience with our 65-room Shelter-in-Place hotel reaffirmed what a community can accomplish even in the midst of crisis. It began as an experiment in simple survival - along the way, it became something more. We experienced belonging. We promised each other that, above all, our lives would be better – not worse – because of our journey together. By believing in each other, by trusting each other, by working hard for each other – we achieved a remarkable placement rate in permanent housing. We transformed one another along the way...

Our Employment Program continues to set a standard for employment success – nearly 300 job placements in the depths of a pandemic - rooted in the simple, but indispensable commit-

HIGHLIGHTS OF FY 2021-2022

ur Employment Program helped nearly 550 low-income and homeless job seekers connect with employers through hiring and job fairs, individualized support services, job readiness resources, support groups, and networking with workforce agencies. Nearly 300 vulnerable job seekers secured full or part-time jobs. Dozens of new hires obtained stable housing because of employment earnings.

More than 130 artists, 4 local galleries, and nearly 400 community members, art enthusiasts, and Hospitality House supporters participated in THHE AUCTION, our 37th annual art auction celebrating the artists of

on celebrating the artists of our Community Arts Program. The event raised more than \$100,000, in much-needed support for neighborhood artists.

By cultivating trust with each resident, Hospitality House's Shelter-In-Place (SIP) Hotel staff successfully relocated 77% of its residents to permanent supportive housing – the most success of any organization who partnered the City of San Francisco to manage the 25 SIP hotels established during the height of the pandemic. Our Tenderloin Self-Help Centers provided peer counseling, case management, mental health services, vocational resources, substance use services, socialization activities, and access to basic amenities to nearly 7,000 individuals this past year.

Our Sixth Street Self-Help Center (SSHC) provided support for nearly 11,000 community members. The frontline staff of SSHC distributed more than 300 "Covid Care Kits" with masks, hand sanitizer, hygiene products, and information guides throughout the Sixth Street and South-of-Market neighborhoods.



Cherie Davis, Program Manager of our Sixth Street Self-Help Center, was one of eleven community leaders honored by the San Francisco Board of Supervisors during Black History Month. Cherie was recognized for her year-round work with neighborhood residents of the Tenderloin and Sixth Street Corridor. Nearly 1,000 life-saving Narcan kits distributed to community members throughout the year.

SIXTH STREET SELF-HELP CENTER

he Sixth Street Self-Help Center offers a range of emergency, behavioral health, and support services, including but not limited to peer counseling, case management, housing referrals, income support, mental health and substance use resources, individual and group therapy, social engagement, and access to basic amenities. Nearly 11,000 low-income community members obtained support from these crucial services this past fiscal year.



TENDERI OIN SELE-HELP CENTER

he Tenderloin Self-Help Center offers low-threshold services for those who do not otherwise use traditional services, including peer counseling, case management, individual and group harm reduction therapy, peer-led support groups, and socialization activities. Nearly 7,000 community members utilized services at the Tenderloin Self-Help Center this past year.

COMMUNITY BUILDING PROGRAM

ur Community Building Program (CBP) is a hub for civic engagement, leadership development, and community building; offering housing support, civic engagement, and healing through our unique trauma-informed project to help residents manage and heal from the trauma of poverty; nearly 400 hundred community residents participated in 19 civic activities. CBP also hosted an essential vaccination and COVID-19 testing site and was an official voting location for Tenderloin neighborhood residents.


n Spring 2020, Hospitality House moved residents from our shelter into private hotel rooms, at the onset of the City's major COVID-19 outbreak. We were the City's first single adult shelter to take this life-saving step. Three months later, the City asked Hospitality House to staff a 65-room Shelter-in-Place (SIP) hotel for COVID-vulnerable residents.

Along the way, we learned so much about each other, about our work, about our humanity - in the midst of the pandemic. About economic injustice, racial inequities, and health care disparities in the City of St. Francis. Of human suffering and human frailties. Of human dignity. We learned to appreciate the untold stories of so many faces from so many places. The power of human touch. We challenged our beliefs, suspended our judgements – and summoned our better selves for this renewed purpose. We reaffirmed our reason for being.

There were tears and triumphs, many difficult days, even longer nights. Dawn almost always brought new promise, but occasionally, it brought new heartbreak. We reimagined what we could inspire in each other, by opening our minds and hearts to new possibilities – even in tragedy. After the unfortunate death of a well-known resident, staff and residents needed a constructive way to grieve. With the help

of Hospitality House Community Arts Program, they created a movable mural, with brushstrokes and quotes from residents, to celebrate the life of the deceased.

The relationships that we have developed have been stored in my heart... Knowing that [we] had the opportunity and the power to change lives has been emotionally gratifying.

The people of the Shelter in Place Hotel at 587 Eddy left their mark on us. They touched us, taught us, transformed us. We exchanged the timeless gift of our humanity. In our twoyear sojourn, we met many wandering souls. We also met a few soulful wanderers – memories all. As they embarked on their new journey – remarkably, more than 75 residents would secure permanent housing - many asked us the same question: "Will you come visit me when I move?"

Our answer is an enthusiastic YES! You helped us become better, stronger, and more hopeful. As our Hospitality House emergency shelter reopens this Fall, we've rediscovered a simple, but timeless lesson from the depths of the pandemic: we need each other.

COMMUNITY ARTS PROGRAM

he Community Arts Program offers the City's only free studio and gallery space for hundreds of low-income artists to create, house and sell artwork. We offer open studio hours, free supplies and skills workshops for community artists, and frequent exhibitions and themed shows. Each year, dozens of struggling artists keep 100% of the proceeds from art sales - a unique social enterprise.

EMPLOYMENT PROGRAM

he Employment Program offers job readiness, employment and training resources, job hiring fairs, and job placement through two neighborhood job centers. We have relationships with dozens of Bay Area employers to connect hundreds of job seekers and we convene a coalition of community-based workforce providers to advocate for low-income job seekers.

Knowing that you're a tiny part of a step in someone's life, whether that's getting an apartment, getting a job – maybe the first job or apartment they've ever had in their life, to have somewhere that is their own - knowing you're a part, even a teeny little part of that process, that's what [Case Management] is about. Through our Employment Program, nearly 300 job seekers obtained gainful full or part-time employment, almost one-third of homeless job seekers secured longer-term housing because of increased earnings, and 65% of new hires maintained employment for three months or more.

WALK WITH WINDY

early 100 neighborhood residents and community members met at our Community Building Program in the Tenderloin for Hospitality House's "Walk With Windy". This one-of-a-kind voter mobilization effort was inspired by Hospitality House's Director of Community Engagement Windy Click, a former "lifer" who chose to celebrate her first opportunity to vote after completing her parole in 2018 - by bringing community members to City Hall to vote! Since 2018, hundreds of community members have walked with Windy to City Hall to exercise their right to vote.


